"Oklahoma Historians Hall of Fame—William Brown Morrison"

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Whereas Emmet Starr was a historian for his people, William Brown Morrison was a historian to his regional community. Born in Virginia, Morrison moved west to teach first in Texas and then in the Choctaw Nation at Durant Presbyterian College. He served as president of the college for ten years, then became a professor of history at Southeastern State College in Durant in 1922.

While teaching several generations of students, Morrison discovered the rich vein of history at his doorstep. In the best tradition of regional history flowering in the 1920s and 1930s, he produced a series of articles for *The Chronicles of Oklahoma* that included topics such as the Reverend Cyrus Kingsbury, Forts McCullough, Washita, Towson, and Arbuckle, Colbert's Ferry, and several biographies. His books, all written with a literary flair, included *Red Man's Trail*, *An Oklahoman Abroad*, *Out in Oklahoma*, and *Military Camps and Posts*. Obviously, Morrison understood the rewards of state and local history.
