#### COUNTY SEAT WAR IN MULTIPOUR CORNET

The contest between Chresteln and Bufeuls for the location of the county seat in McIntesh County soen after Oldshoon starthood was climaxed by a real battle. The following story is contributed to The Chronicles by Mr. W. R. Withington, an attorney of Oklahoma City and member of the Historical Society, who lived in Enfants in 1908.

## CRECOTAH-EUFAULA COURT HOUSE RIOT

When I came to South McAlester in the Indian Territory as a boy in the Fall of 1907. I hardly expected to see, much less take part in, one of the historical events of the old Indian Territory part of Oklahama.

One of my first employments was that of a telephone operaor at Countley, Okhihoma, some for miles now the South Mo-Alester. After morking at Crender for availle I was promoted in May, 1998, to the position of telephone operator at the Housishing town of Eufenia, then working for what had been originity its South Mo-Alester-Bardual Telephone Company. In 1905, the Pienser Telephone and Telegraph Commany bought the controlling interest in the South Mo-Alester-Bardual Telethon the Company of the Company. I was too young then to pay any attention to politics. The building in which the telephone office was then located is still standing on the corner of Main Street and Foley Avanue across the street from the old Tully Building. The telephone office was on the second floor. Nothing unusual construct after the election until Stunday, June 7, 1908. Abort noon on this Stunday, I was on the job working at the telephone switchboard, answering the few calls that came in. There was no sign of impending danger; everything was calm and penecial; and the atmosphere, you might say, was the tusted one to be expected in a small town on a Standay novening in the sunnertime—"all quiet along the Petomae" as it were.

Suddenly, things began to harvee. The M.R.ET. ("Raty") train from Mankages and Cheschal was late and arrived in Bufaula about 100.1. A group of men from Checotal pct off the train, stiff with guns, and they began seattering out over the town of Eufanik preparatory to taking it over. Part of them went north, circuita around to the court house for the purpose. The rest of them went to different parts of the town. Some of them came up Toley Avonus between the Telephone Building and the old Tully Building, shooting as they came some of the builten thirt in the telephone building. I sought security behind the telephone switchboard, and I did not come out until the shooting had subsided. A number of the citizens of Enfants had appeared moon the scene armed and the situation was tense for quite awhile until an armistice was acreed upon. When I felt that it was safe to go down on the street, I found out that one of the men from Checotah, Mr. Frank Jones had told Deputy Constable Woods of Enfanla and Deputy City Marshal Kleiser of Enfauls to get out of the street and out of town or he would give them the contents of his gun. A Mr. Permenter of the Cheentah group was said to have shot Deputy Constable F. M. Woods of Enfaula, Whether it was Mr. Parmenter or sameone else Dennty Constable Woods was badly wounded and died, as I recall, later that day. The Checotah group was not successful in securing possession of the County records. Enfants became the county seat of McIntosh County, things enjeted down and I survived this "wild and wooly" event in the history of the old Indian Territory part of Oklahoma
